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THE 2012 CALIFORNIA VINTAGE continues to impress, and this week's Wine Spectator Insider features the highest-rated wine yet from the bunch, a remarkable Napa Cabernet at 97 points. These are the wines that our editors have been most excited by in recent tastings.

The 2012 lineup from Napa standout Bevan knocks it out of the park in this report, but Old World fans will find wines to love from France's Southern Rhône Valley, as well as from Germany, where Riesling is king. The dry reds of Portugal come on strong in 2012 after a watershed 2011 vintage, and Pinot pursuers can look to great examples in Oregon.
